COME TO FIRST NIGHT!

We invite your participation in our opening night of fun and frolic:

First Night Noreascon
Thursday, September 2
7 p.m. to 11 p.m.
Hynes Convention Center
Costumes and fancy dress encouraged!

First Night is your chance to sample what the convention has to offer, in the festive atmosphere of a street fair. We'll have games and demonstrations, music and dance, jugglers and magicians, face painting, balloon animals, and a caricature artist.

Radiating out from the central Midway, First Night will have activities throughout the Hynes second floor.

In the ConCourse, you'll have a chance to tour the many exhibits based on our Guests of Honor and fannish history, in addition to a fabulous collection of costumes from past masquerades. *The Mended Drum* will have fannish entertainment and refreshments, and you just might find a few familiar characters from the works of our Terry Pratchett lurking about. In the nearby Fan Lounge, you'll get a chance to contribute to the *First Night One-Shot Fanzine*, and at Sales to Members you'll be able to purchase a souvenir t-shirt or our guest of honor books.

Down the hall, in Room 210, *Club SF* will be running throughout the evening. Items we have on tap include a Thomas the Rhymer show by Ellen Kushner, a short preview of *The Filkado* (which will be presented in full later in the convention), and William Tenn's humorous reading of "On Venus Have We Got a Rabbi".

The program division has prepared a feast of short, light program items to add to First Night. Come prepared to contribute to "Live Fancyclopedia" (fannish anecdotes) or your favorite 5-minute reading. Or perhaps compete in Punday or the Trivia Bowl, or fannish charades. We'll bring you the Midwest favorite, "Ask Dr. Mike", and we're still

working on "Fannish Eye for the Mundane Guy".

In the media department, the secondary film room will be showing previews and short clips of some of the films that will be presented during the run of the convention, and Bob Eggleton may show some of his treasured Godzilla footage.

At one end of the Midway, in Room 200, you'll find the *Ankh Morpork Ball*, where you can dance to just about any type of music. Bring your favorite tunes to add to the excitement.

Upstairs, the Art Show and the Retrospective Art Exhibit will be open for viewing and docent tours. And in the hall below, we'll have a special part of the Midway set aside for artists, with artist demonstrations and program items (such as a Cartoon Jam or a Pictionary competition).

In the Midway, we'll have game booths sponsored by various fan clubs (complete with silly prizes), along with more entertainment, like belly dancers, jugglers, and magicians. There will also be things you can participate in; a theremin you can actually try to play yourself, origami lessons, learn to juggle 3 balls in 30 minutes, or play blackjack (for fun) with a professional dealer.

We're hoping that a lot of you will come in costume, and we'll have hall costume awards and will try to have a hall costume photo area. And for those of you who can't manage a costume in advance, we're hoping to set up an Instant Masquerade program item that will give you some assistance. There also will be a children's costume corner where we'll supply materials and help for kids to make their own magic wand or sparkle crown.

And those are only the activities we know about so far. We're still working on ideas, and we hope that when you come to First Night, you'll find lots of surprises and have plenty of things to choose from.

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The ConCourse

Take a room, a BIG room — over 35,000 square feet (3,000+ square meters). Make it out of concrete and install an ugly concrete pillar every 30 feet. That's Exhibit Hall C of the Hynes.

But, as they say in the real estate business, location, location, location. And this room is between the Hugos/Masquerade and the Dealers' Room, between the Sheraton and the Program rooms, between Pegistration and the Art Show, between where you are and where you're going.

Now install some carpeting, decorations, signs, banners. Bring in lots of couches, chairs, and tables. Build a pub (*The Mended Drum*) and open a restaurant (rat on a stick?!?). Add thousands of fans, and you'll have the ConCourse. Open for First Night and then 9 AM to 2 AM daily. It's our social center, nightclub, museum, and park. Pick a spot, sit down, and everyone you know will walk by at some point. Or walk through to find your friends and lots of surprises. You may not even notice the concrete.

Remember us when you get home! The committee won't get to see a lot of the con but we would appreciate your sharing your con with us. And if something amusing happens to you, or something wicked cool, we'd like to hear about it!

Getting to Noreascon 4

BY CAR:

From the North (Northeastern Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Maine, and adjacent parts of Canada): Take I-93 south to exit 26 (Storrow Drive/North Station), which is a very long, swooping, single-lane freeway of an “exit ramp.” Fork left off that onto Storrow Drive.

Take the Copley Square/Back Bay exit, after the Government Center exit, which T’s into Beacon Street. Turn left onto Beacon, then immediately right onto Arlington Street. Pass the Public Gardens on your left, and cross Boylston Street at its end. After Providence St., turn right onto St. James Avenue.

At Dartmouth Street, St. James jogs a bit left and becomes Huntington Avenue. Continue “straight” on St. James/Huntington Avenue, past Exeter Street, and Ring Road.

To get to the Sheraton: Turn right onto Belvidere Street and turn right into the Sheraton entryway.

To get to the Marriott: From the left turn lane, reverse direction on Huntington at Ring Road. You get a second chance to reverse directions at Belvidere Street (on your right) and West Newton Street (on your left). After Harcourt Street, turn right into the Marriott entryway.

From the West:

Take I-90, the Massachusetts Turnpike, known as the Mass. Pike. (If you are coming north on I-95, take I-91 to I-84 in Connecticut.) This is a toll road, with an automatic toll-taking service called *Fast Lane*. The *Fast Lane* system also accepts *E-Z Pass* transponders. After the Allston-Brighton tolls, stay on the Pike east to Exit 22.

To get to the Sheraton: Take the left fork in the exit tunnel. You emerge on Huntington Avenue. Turn right onto Belvidere Street and turn right into the Sheraton entryway.

To get to the Marriott: Take the right fork in the exit tunnel. You emerge on Stuart Street. Turn left onto Dartmouth Street, and immediately left again onto Huntington Avenue. From the left turn lane, reverse direction on Huntington, then turn right into the Marriott entryway after Garrison Street.

From the Southwest (Rhode Island & eastern Connecticut) Take I-95 north until it intersects the Mass. Pike (on Route 128, at Exit 25). Take the Pike east to Exit 22. (See above.)

From the Southeast (southeastern Massachusetts) Take I-93 (Route 3, Route 1) north. Take Exit 18 onto the Massachusetts Avenue Connector. Turn right onto Mass. Ave. After crossing Albany, Washington, Tremont, and Columbus, turn right onto Huntington Avenue.

To get to the Sheraton: Take the first left, onto Belvidere Street, and turn right into the Sheraton entryway.

To get to the Marriott: Turn right into the Marriott entryway, just after Garrison Street.

BY AIR

Logan International Airport (abbreviation “BOS”) is in Boston. Shuttles (\$10) from it serve all the major hotels. There are multiple shuttle companies, each on a 20-minute cycle, so the wait between shuttles should always be less than 20 minutes. The trip from the airport to Noreascon’s hotels is about 30 minutes.

BY TRAIN

Boston is a major hub for Amtrak. The Downeaster, coming from Maine, comes into North Station. It is best to take a taxi from there to the Sheraton or the Marriott if you have luggage. Trains from other parts of the country terminate in South Station. They pass through Back Bay Station (abbreviation “BBY”), on Dartmouth Street, just on the far side of Copley Place from the Marriott. Prudential Center is diagonally across from the Marriott, and the Sheraton is on the far side of that.

BY BUS

Boston is served by the major bus lines: Bonanza, Greyhound, Peter Pan, and is served by more local services, such as Plymouth & Brockton, Concord and C & J Trailways. For very inexpensive travel between New York City and Boston, there is the Fung Wah bus.

BY SUBWAY (the MBTA)

The Hynes Convention Center, the Sheraton hotel, and the Marriott hotel are all on the Green Line. If you exit the Green Line at the Hynes/ICA stop, take the Massachusetts Avenue exit and turn left. Turn left again onto Boylston Street. Cross the street at the Dalton Street intersection.

This is the entrance to the Hynes; going straight on Dalton takes you to the Sheraton. If you exit the Green Line at Copley Place, walk west (towards traffic) on Boylston Street to Ring Road. Turn left on it, and walk one long block to Huntington Avenue. The Marriott is across the street.

Parking

Each of Noreascon's venues has extensive parking. The Prudential Center underground garage connects to the Sheraton Boston, the Hynes Convention Center, and the Pru's shopping mall. The Copley Place underground parking garage connects to the Marriott Copley Place, and to its own shopping mall. The Sheraton valet rate is \$35 per day, the Marriott's valet park is \$37. Self-park at the hotels is \$31-33 per day (with no in-and-out privileges) depending on exactly where you end up. There are other nearby parking lots and garages, including one up Dalton Street, across from the Sheraton, and one under Christian Science Church Park, also near the Sheraton.

For less expensive parking, you must go farther afield, and accept a certain amount of inconvenience. There are many commuter parking lots outside the city, where one can park and take public transit into town. The most useful of these is Riverside, the MBTA station nearest the intersection of the Mass. Pike (I-90) and Route 128. Take Route 128 south to Exit 22, the Grove Street exit, and follow it east (right) for a mile. It has an enormous open lot, and permits overnight parking, paid for in advance. Travel from there is on the Green line of "the T" which takes you directly to the Hynes and Copley Place stations. There is a larger parking garage, at the Alewife MBTA station on Route 2. Travel from there is on the Red line. Transfer from the Red line at Park Street to the Green line (outbound) will take you to the Hynes and Copley Place stations.

Please check the label of this Progress Report for the spelling of your name. This is how your name will appear on your badge. If it is incorrect, please write to prereg@noreascon.org ASAP with the correction. We will not be printing fan names on badges, but we will be happy to quote it in the middle of your full name as long as it fits. Your PR label should already reflect any requests we have received.

To pick up your name badge, all you will need is the outside page (with your name and address information) of this PR or the confirmation postcard you previously received in the mail. If you don't bring either, you will need to fill out a simple form and show a photo ID.

If you arrive after we've closed Registration for the night, please go to the Convention Office in the Sheraton where preregistered members will receive a temporary night badge good until Registration opens again in the morning.

Transfers

Memberships and Children's Admissions can not be refunded, but may be transferred to another person.

In order to transfer your membership, please send a letter stating to whom you are transferring it along with the address, phone number and email address, if available, of that person. Children's Program

We are hoping to do some tours of the convention (art show, behind-the-scenes with Tech, etc.) as part of our Children's (7-12) Program. However, we will only be able to do this if we have qualified volunteers to help shepherd the kids around! Special Interest Groups

Spaces are going fast – there may be none left by the convention. To guarantee that you have a meeting slot, you should remember to reserve time for your special interest group NOW (sigs@noreascon.org).

Autographing

If there is a line, there will be a three book maximum per person at a time. In other words, if you have more than three books, you must go to the end of the line after the first three are signed.

Kaffeeklatsches

Kaffeeklatsches are a way for fans to relax and drink coffee (or tea) with their favorite SF personality; they will take place in the ConSuite.

In order to ensure that you can be included, you (not someone else signing up for you!) *must* sign up, in advance, at Information in the Concourse in Hall C of the Hynes.

You may sign up for a kaffeeklatsch no more than 24 hours in advance of it. (That means, that if there is a kaffeeklatsch you want to see at 2:00 pm on Saturday, you will be able to sign up starting at 2:00 pm on Friday.) Sign-up will continue until all slots are taken (9 per klatsch—we will post information about whether a kaffeeklatsch is closed as soon as this occurs), or until one hour before the klatsch is scheduled. If there are any places left after that time, you can check in with the KK manager in the ConSuite. If there aren't any spaces left...well, then there aren't any spaces...for anyone.

Literary Beers

These are opportunities to hang out with people in a bar setting (you must buy your own, sorry!). Literary Beers will take place in the *Mended Drum* in the ConCourse (and possibly in the Sheraton Bar). Sign-up will be handled the same way as Kaffeeklatsches.

ATTENTION Game Masters & Players... The Gaming Committee wants YOU!

We want to make the games scene the best a Worldcon has ever seen. To do that, the Gaming Committee needs your help. We need GameMasters (GMs) for all sorts of games, from Dungeons and Dragons to Big Eyes, Small Mouth, from Toon to GURPS. If you have run a game before, bring it to Worldcon!

We're looking for all kinds of games, not just table-top role-playing—if you love board games, wargames, Cheapass games, card games, constructible sailing ship games, there's space and support for you. Come with your game and a willingness to teach and we'll provide the players.

Live Action games? Send us a proposal and we'll coordinate space.

While there will be space for pickup games, all GMs must register with the Gaming Committee. Send an email with your name, the game or games you'd like to run, and your GM'ing experience to gaming@noreascon.org. We'll be in contact to coordinate times, space, and the support we're getting from the company that makes your game. Game companies will have representatives attending, too!

Again, we can't stress enough how important it is to contact us first—it makes the difference between having your own table, a place in the schedule, and players vs. trying to scramble a game together at the last minute.

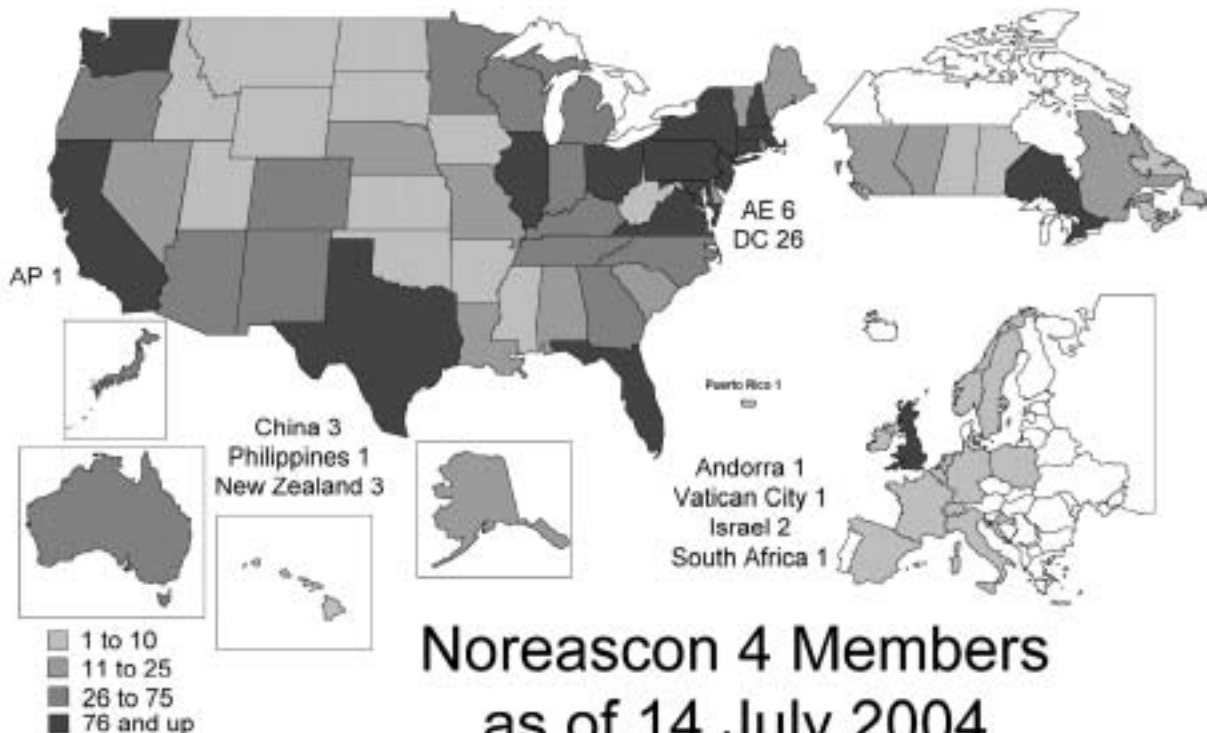
Smoking Policy

DANCING DRUNK

Well, I don't know about Dancing Naked, but I *have* Danced Drunk. Dead drunk.

It happened in 1988 at Nolacon, that strangest of worldcons. I mean, it started well enough with a big 'Welcome' party in one of the two hotels they were using, but then the whole convention evaporated mysteriously into thin air. Next morning I wandered endlessly between the Marriott and Sheraton, dodging the traffic racing between them down busy Canal Street, and eventually gave up. Nothing seemed to be going on anywhere, so I went and sat in the lobby with the other Brits.

The Marriott had this vast, empty reception space with acres of marble floor and they'd dumped an assortment of tables, chairs and potted plants in the middle to make the place look a bit more lived-in. This little island was colonised by our party, people like Greg Pickersgill and Dave Hodgson, Martin Hoare, John Jarrold, the fearsome Gamma, and a few others. We went out to Brennans, and The Old Absinthe House, but mostly we sat on our island, drinking beer and watching people go past in the far distance, trying to recognise fans. "Look, there's Ted White!" "No it's not, he doesn't have that much hair." Occasionally someone important stopped by, like Greg Benford, Dave Hartwell, and Charles Sheffield. There didn't seem to be many fans we knew.

On Sunday evening we found a fish restaurant down Bourbon Street, but it wasn't a great occasion. Greg was in one of his Black Moods, when he scowls and goes very quiet, so I cut out and went looking for some fun. I found a bar, and slid onto a stool. "Hey, where'reya from?" came the standard greeting. "From England? He's from England! Get the guy a drink!" My new friends were Texans, and they kindly plied me with something called 'New England Iced Tea'. It was long and cool and tasted good, so I knocked it back and ordered another. Maybe I had a third, but for some reason I don't remember anything very clearly after that.

On the way back to the hotel I bought a second-hand trombone in a big black carry-case from a musical instrument shop. It only cost \$100.00 or like that, and it seemed a good idea at the time. They were impressed, back on the island, though none of us could get a note out of it.

I sat there feeling stranger and stranger, with my time-sense going haywire like in that James Blish story. The others were saying something to me but I couldn't understand what it was, so I grinned and waved and they went away. It was such a *nice* feeling! Five minutes later the words slowly put themselves into order in my brain, "Are you coming? We're going to the Sex Maniacs' Ball. Well, we're going now, then."

Staggering up to my room, I deposited the trombone

It was an incredible disco, run by a local fan (Bob Briney, I think his name was), who was playing *exactly* the right music. I found a partner, went on the floor, and danced my little heart out. It was a great night, although I was handicapped by not knowing who I was dancing with. It didn't hurt, not until I tried to walk, that is.

Somehow, during all that mad dancing I had broken a bone in my foot, and had been too drunk to notice. It had to be strapped-up in elastic bandage, the purple colour lasted for weeks, and I've never again been tempted to drink New England Iced Tea.*
